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Purpose of this report

This report supports amendments to the *State Development and Public Works Organisation Regulation* 2020 to facilitate access to land for investigations, undertaking investigatory works for and development of a strategic assessment for the Julia Creek/Richmond Critical Minerals Zone Water Delivery Options to deliver common user water infrastructure for critical minerals projects at Julia Creek/Richmond. The amendment regulation is provided for under ss. 99, 100, 102 and 173 of the *State Development and Public Works Organisation Act 1971*.

Background

The Julia Creek/Richmond area has been identified as a Critical Minerals Zone in the Queensland Critical Minerals Strategy. The Julia Creek/Richmond area has significant vanadium resources with the potential to develop a significant critical minerals industry for Queensland. There are currently seven known vanadium projects proposed in the Julia Creek/Richmond area at various stages of development.

Known barriers to the establishment of a critical minerals industry in the Julia Creek/Richmond area include the costs and length of time spent undertaking environmental and other survey work to support approval applications, funding project-specific infrastructure, approval and tenure processes and gaining access to secure a reliable water supply which is a highly regulated and scarce resource.

The Coordinator-General can facilitate common-user water infrastructure as a potential solution to deliver a reliable water supply to proponents while addressing high costs and environmental impacts of setting up project-specific infrastructure.

2. The Project

2.1 Responsible entity

SunWater Limited is a bulk water infrastructure developer and manager, and a statutory Government Owned Corporation under the *Government Owned Corporations Act 1993 (Qld)*.

2.2 Project description

A strategic assessment for Julia Creek/Richmond Critical Minerals Zone Water Delivery Options is required in accordance with stage 1 of the Queensland Government Business Case Development Framework (BCDF), to analyse options available to supply reliable water to critical minerals projects in the Julia Creek/Richmond area on an interim and permanent basis.

The Strategic Assessment will develop and assess a long list of options and include socio-economic, environmental, financial and sustainability desktop studies for each option. The Strategic Assessment will be delivered by 30 June 2024.

SunWater will submit reports on the progress of the project works to the Coordinator-General on a monthly basis and in a form agreed with the Coordinator-General.

2.3 Project location

Julia Creek is approximately 650 kilometres west of Townsville and 250 kilometres east of Mount Isa. Julia Creek falls within the McKinlay Shire Council local government area.

Richmond is approximately 500 kilometres west of Townsville and 400 kilometres east of Mount Isa. Richmond falls within the Richmond Shire Council local government area.

The Gulf Water Plan and the Great Artesian Basin and Other Aquifers (GABORA) Water Plan are both relevant to the Julia Creek and Richmond areas.

2.4 Land Requirements

In order to develop the strategic assessment, temporary access to and use of privately owned land for purposes such as investigative works may be required.

2.5 Coordinator-General

The Coordinator-General has functions and powers to facilitate large-scale and complex projects, while ensuring their environmental and social impacts are properly managed.

The Coordinator-General will provide assistance to deliver the strategic assessment through the use of functions and powers relating to land access under the *State Development and Public Works Organisation Act 1971*.

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
